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Trustees' Annual Report For the Year Ended 31 March 2020

The trustees, who for the purposes of company law are the directors of the limited company (hereinafter referred to as 'Trustees'), are pleased to present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2020.

Objectives and Activities

The charitable purposes of the Scottish Fair Trade Forum (the Forum) are to relieve poverty by establishing, maintaining and promoting Scotland as a Fair Trade Nation, thereby to improve the work of the voluntary sector and effectiveness of charities forming part of the Fair Trade movement by:

- a) supporting, building, extending and maintaining the Fair Trade movement in and throughout Scotland
- b) educating stakeholders and the public generally through the production of relevant information, marketing and promotion of Fair Trade at every level of Scottish society
- c) facilitating and exchanging knowledge and information between Scotland and other Fair Trade countries and communities; and
- d) facilitating and exchanging knowledge and information between Scotland and Fair Trade producers in developing countries.

The Forum's Mission, Vision and Aims are:

Vision: The Scottish Fair Trade Forum works to help make Scotland a nation which is a global leader in challenging global poverty and recognises the dignity and rights of producers through a commitment to fairness in international trading.

Mission: The Scottish Fair Trade Forum exists to maintain Fair Trade Nation status for Scotland and build upon that achievement to embed the values of Fair Trade in all aspects of Scottish society.

Aims

- 1. To maintain and develop Fair Trade Nation status.
- 2. To integrate Fair Trade principles into decision-making and procedures at all levels of government in Scotland
- 3. To encourage the business community to integrate Fair Trade principles and corporate accountability into all aspects of their business, and to encourage the growth of the Fair Trade sector in Scotland.
- 4. To develop and enable strategic partnerships with communities and activists.
- 5. To engage the broader public in Scotland's Fair Trade Nation campaign by raising awareness and encouraging understanding of the role of Fair Trade in creating a more sustainable world.
- 6. To strengthen links with producer communities and continue to promote awareness of the mutual benefits derived by consumers and producers from Fair Trade.

The Trustees have undertaken to refresh the Vision, Mission and Aims of the Forum as part of the Strategic Plan 2020-22.

Achievements and Performance

Having achieved Fair Trade Nation status in February 2013 and had that status successfully reassessed in February 2017, the Forum continues to be engaged with ensuring that the achievement is maintained and developed, working at all levels of society to increase awareness and understanding of Fair Trade, seeking to influence purchasing and trading practices.

In 2019/20, the Forum had further core funding from the Scottish Government for one year linked to agreed activities, outputs and outcomes agreed in two six month extensions of funding. These two six month extensions were further interim measures while the Scottish Government held a review of how it supported Fair Trade. From April 2020, the Forum has a two-year funding arrangement with the Scottish Government and a commitment to return to three-year funding cycles from April 2022.

Achievements and Performance (continued)

The Forum has continued to support a thriving campaign network though our national events programme, regional sessions and also community events with visiting Fair Trade producers. We worked with local groups and the Fairtrade Foundation to put on a public event to celebrate 25 years of the Fairtrade Mark and to deliver a flagship panel event on women's empowerment and living incomes during Fairtrade Fortnight. During the year, with initial support from the Forum, North Lanarkshire was awarded Fairtrade Zone status, the 28th local authority area in Scotland to be awarded such status. Our Annual General Meeting and Conference was held in Motherwell. The Annual Fair Trade Lecture was held in Edinburgh looking at Fair Trade principles in the gold and minerals business.

The Forum has continued to support local grassroots activities through our Community Grants Scheme. The Forum has also continued in its support for Fair Trade suppliers in Scotland in order to strengthen and develop the market for Fair Trade products. This support has involved bespoke advice, support for events and promotional work. It has also involved work to assist in facilitating public procurement of Fair Trade products. We have continued work on the Rwandan Coffee Project, which is led by Challenges Worldwide, and we launched a promotional film about the project during Fairtrade Fortnight.

After a successful audit based on the ten Fair Trade Principles, the Forum was awarded network membership of the World Fair Trade Organization. The Forum represented Scotland at the International Fair Trade Towns Conference in Cardiff showcasing the work of Fair Trade Groups across Scotland and cofacilitating a workshop on youth engagement activities.

The importance of Fair Trade as part of Global Citizenship Education and learning for sustainability have remained an important part of the Forum's work. Aubrey Chilenje and Nduzani Zaya from Kasinthula Cane Growers' Association in Malawi visited six Scottish schools and spoke to more than 500 pupils during Fairtrade Fortnight. With European Union Bridge 47 funding, the Forum brought together young people and established campaigners to create the Fair Trade Campaign Toolkit. The Forum continued to be a member of IDEAS Scotland and collaborate with the Development Education Centres.

The Forum continues to provide the Secretariat for the Scottish Parliament Cross Party Group which held four meetings during the year covering topics such as sports balls, sugar production and Fair Trade shops. The Scottish Government Minister for International Development attended and spoke at the annual Scottish Fair Trade Awards. Fair Trade continues to have wide political support in Scotland.

Coronavirus and 'lockdown'

The effect of the Coronavirus pandemic and the 'lockdown' measures have had only a very limited impact on the period covered by these accounts. However, for reporting purposes the Trustees recognise the potential impact on the Forum going forward. The immediate response of the Forum to the public health emergency was to focus on protecting the wellbeing of staff, volunteers, trustees, partners and stakeholders. Prior to 'lockdown' the Forum ceased holding public events or taking part in face-to-face meetings and it moved its staff team to remote working. The Trustees identified three major risks to the Forum: operational; governance and compliance; and financial.

On operational matters, it can be reported that no significant problems have occurred with equipment or staff due to remote working. The staff team have been able to continue with work to support and engage with Fair Trade businesses and campaigners.

In terms of governance and compliance, there were initial concerns that the production of the annual accounts and reporting to OSCR and Companies House could be delayed by the closure of Robertson House as paperwork which would be required by the Independent Examiner was stored there. However, access to Robertson House was possible to retrieve paperwork and from this financial year all documentation will be stored digitally on an ongoing basis meaning that this potential problem will not recur.

Trustees' Annual Report (continued)

On assessing the financial risks, Trustees noted the risk to some income generation activities and these were reviewed with support from a consultant through the Scottish Government's Just Enterprise programme. This has led to a revised Development Plan. In general, it has been necessary to take into account some possible delays to some income and also to look at redesigning some income generating activities. However, it has also been possible to identify new potential income generating activities. The Forum was also successful in being awarded a grant from the Third Sector Resilience Fund to offset delays in other income generation being able to take place.

Financial Review

The income and expenditure for the year is set out in the Statement of Financial Activities on page 8, which shows restricted and unrestricted funds in separate columns. This shows a decrease in funds of £3,249 during the year, with a decrease in unrestricted funds of £1,478 and in restricted funds of £1,771. The movement on each separate fund is shown in note 11 on page 14.

Income increased to £190,686 from £181,331, mainly due to an increase in earned income from consultancy work carried out during the year. Expenditure increased slightly to £193,935 compared to £191,321 in the previous year. A detailed analysis of expenditure is shown in note 3 on pages 11-12.

Total funds at the year end amounted to £11,779. The general unrestricted fund was £7,214, there was a designated fixed assets fund of £552, and restricted funds of £4,013 were held for the purposes outlined in note 11.

Reserves Policy

It is our policy to hold 'free' reserves equivalent to at least 3 months' fixed costs, estimated at around £31,375 and at no point should these be more than 18 months' fixed costs. At the end of the year, the charity held unrestricted free reserves, excluding those held as fixed assets, of £7,214. The Trustees are actively seeking ways to grow reserves through generating unrestricted income from donations, events and income generating consultancy and services as well as ensuring that all core and project expenditure remains within budgeted and funded levels. The Trustees have noted that reserves have not increased over the last year. A review of the Forum's Development Plan has been undertaken by the Development Manager, overseen by the Chief Executive and supported through a consultant provided by the Scottish Government's Just Enterprise programme. The revised Development Plan has reviewed proposed income generating activities in light of lessons already learnt while introducing new activities and also in light of the Coronavirus pandemic, 'lockdown' and projected effects. This revised Development Plan has been reviewed by the Treasurer and presented to and agreed by the Board. The plan sets out activities to increase reserves to within the agreed reserves policy within the next two financial years, by the end of March 2022. The Trustees have re-established a Development Group to oversee this work.

Structure, Governance and Management

The Scottish Fair Trade Forum (the Forum) is a company limited by guarantee, with the liability of members limited to £1 each. The company is governed by the terms of its Memorandum and Articles of Association and is a registered Scottish charity. Trustees (who are directors of the company) are recruited from the membership. Up to three Trustees are elected by each section of the membership: the 'Individual Members', the 'Small Business and Organisation Members', the Medium Business and Organisation Members', the 'Large Business and Organisation Members' and up to three Trustees co-opted by the Board. A third of the Trustees are subject to re-election each year. Three trustees stepped down at the AGM and one new Trustee was elected. At the end of the financial year, there were nine Trustees.

Trustees continue to be encouraged to keep up to date with their responsibilities under charity and company law. A Trustee Handbook reflecting current best practice is issued to all Trustees. The Trustees meet a minimum of five times per year and are responsible for the strategic direction and policies of the charity. They are aware of the major risks affecting the charity and consider that, as far as possible, appropriate procedures are in place to mitigate those risks. The names of those who served as Trustees during the year are shown below together with other reference and administrative information.

The Forum continues to operate successfully from offices in Robertson House in central Glasgow. Robertson House is operated by the Robertson Trust as a hub for third sector organisations. As from mid-March due to the Coronavirus pandemic and 'lockdown', the Forum staff team have been working remotely.

Report of the Independent Examiner To the Trustees of Scottish Fair Trade Forum

I report on the accounts of Scottish Fair Trade Forum for the year ended 31 March 2020, which are set out on pages 8 to 16.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2020

1. Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis and in accordance with the requirements of:

- the Companies Act 2006
- Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) issued on 16 July 2014 (Charities SORP (FRS102)); and
- the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102).

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS102.

The Trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the ability of the charity to continue as a going concern for the foreseeable future. In particular, the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic has been assessed, as outlined in the trustees' annual report, with no significant impact on the going concern position of the charity. Accordingly, the accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis.

Income

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably. Income received by way of grants and donations is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Where entitlement is conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, grants are recognised when the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance. Where a grant or donation is given for a specific purpose, it is included in restricted income and any unexpended portion is carried forward as a restricted fund.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. The charity has opted not to report on the activity basis. Expenditure is instead reported by cost type.

Other Basic Financial Instruments

The charity only has financial assets and liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

Taxation

The company is recognised as a charity for the purposes of applicable taxation legislation and is therefore not subject to taxation on its charitable activities. No charge to corporation tax arose during the year. The charity is not registered for VAT and accordingly any irrecoverable VAT incurred is included within the item of expenses to which it relates.

Pensions

The charity makes pension contributions to defined contribution pension schemes on behalf of its employees. Contributions are charged to expenditure as they become payable.

Leases

Rentals under operating leases are charged on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

1. Accounting Policies (continued)

Investments

Programme related (social) investments are included at the amount originally invested less any impairment. The trustees do not consider any impairment is needed.

Funds

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with any of the charitable objects at the discretion of the Directors.

Designated funds are set aside by the Directors out of unrestricted funds for specific future purposes or projects. There is also a designated fixed asset fund corresponding to the book value of tangible fixed assets.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular purposes.

Notes on funds:

- (a) The development fund, arising from specific donations received by the charity, is for the purpose of building the capacity of the Forum to meet new challenges and develop the commitment to Scotland being a Fair Trade Nation. The balance carried forward will be spent in subsequent years.
- (b) The Santander fund relates to a grant received towards the costs of two interns, which was fully spent during the year.
- (c) The core Scottish Government grant is to support the Forum delivering its work in leading and coordinating activity to maintain and develop Scotland's Fair Trade Nation status. The balance on the fund is carried forward to be spent in the subsequent financial year with the agreement of the funder.
- (d) The Challenges Worldwide fund represents the charity's element of a Scottish Government grant to support coffee growers in Rwanda, for which Challenges Worldwide is the lead partner. The grant period runs for 5 years from April 2017. The balance carried forward will be spent in the subsequent financial year.
- (e) The charity received a grant from the Bridge 47 programme operated by the Finnish Development NGOs Fingo ry, which was for a project to educate and empower young people to support Fair Trade. The project was completed during the year.
- (f) The charity took part in the SCVO Cyber Essentials training programme during the year and received a grant of £1,000 to fund participation in this process, which was successfully completed during the year.
- (g) Designated fixed asset fund: This corresponds to the net book value of fixed assets. The net book value at the start of the year has been transferred in to the fund. Annual depreciation is charged to this fund and the cost of any fixed assets purchased is transferred into the fund.
